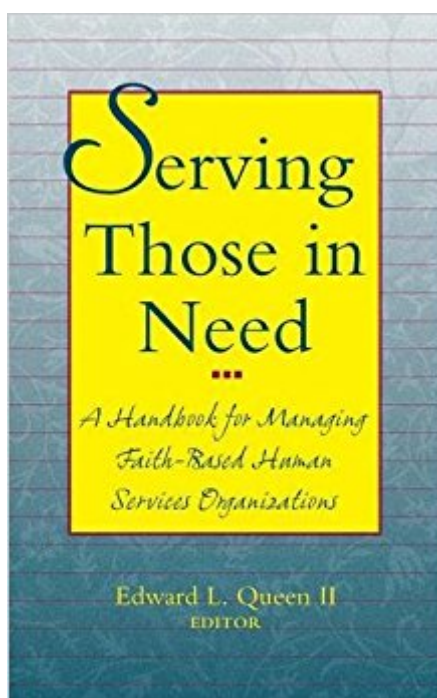


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# Serving Those In Need : A Handbook For Managing Faith-Based Human Services Organizations
