

In two dense but clear chapters the author presents very complete color concepts. The remainder of the book shows exercises to clarify and cement the concepts. One comes away with a feeling of good understanding and of course the absolute delight of playing with color.

I have bought numerous books on color theory and this book is the best. It's not a scholarly epistle but very practical and shows great knowledge. I am about halfway through the series of exercises and have learned a great deal. I have been painting for many years and have new insight.
