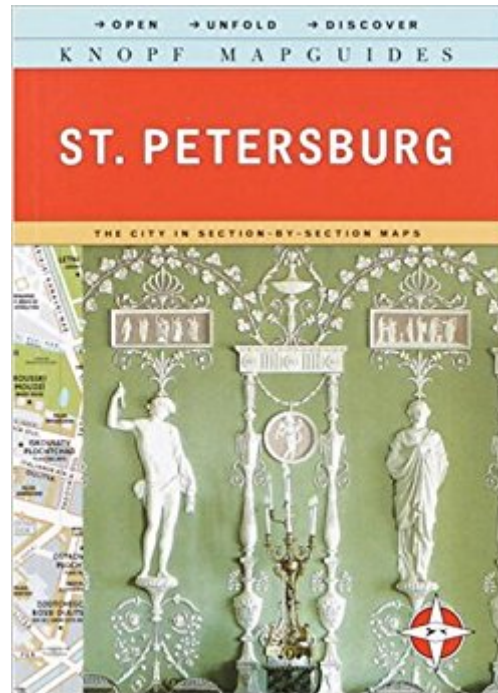




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Knopf MapGuide: St. Petersburg

This opening fold-out contains a general map of St. Petersburg to help you visualize the 6 large districts discussed in this guide, and 4 pages of valuable information, handy tips and useful addresses. Discover St. Petersburg through 6 districts and 6 maps: St Isaac's Cathedral/ The Admiralty/ The Hermitage/ Nevsky Prospekt/ The Summer Garden/ Gostiny dvor/ Haymarket/ Theater Square/ Vasilyevsky Island/ Petrograd side/ Peter and Paul Fortress/ Fontanka/ Smolny/ Alexander Nevsky Monastery. For each district there is a double-page of addresses (restaurants listed in ascending order of price, cafés, bars, tearooms, music venues and stores) followed by a fold-out map for the relevant area with the essential places to see (indicated on the map by a star *). These places are by no means all that St. Petersburg has to offer but to us they are unmissable. The grid-referencing system (A B2) makes it easy for you to pinpoint addresses quickly on the map. Transportation and hotels in St Petersburg. The last fold-out consists of a transportation map and 4 pages of practical information that include a selection of hotels. A thematic index lists all the sites and addresses featured in this guide.

As the founder of a company devoted to enriching cultural and business travel to Russia, we are always looking for a good books to recommend for our clients. One rare book in my collection of Avant-Garde graphics is by Alexandr Rodchenko and Varvara Stepanova, "Moscow Reconstructed." Written in 1936, it is a huge volume which describes with pride the re-construction of Moscow, the capital of world socialism. Throughout there are pop-ups, handles which take away old scenes and uncover new vistas. "Knopf MapGuide: St. Petersburg" reminds me of "Moscow Reconstructed" in that it encourages the reader to interact with the text by unfolding a series of bound maps and viewing the selected neighborhood along with the best in sites, shops and restaurants. Most of the major streets are in both Cyrillic and Latin script, something most maps available in the West don't have. The listings of sites in each neighborhood will please most any visitor to the center of St. Petersburg, and the names are given in both Cyrillic and Latin (but because of the translation of names from Russian to French to English, some are unfamiliar-"Nest of Nobles", for instance, went unrecognized by the popular restaurant's staff!). There are no web sites for sites, nor is there admission pricing listed, although the restaurants have the price of an 'average' entree. "Knopf MapGuide: St. Petersburg" is a unique guide in its small size and easy-to-use format. This book is actually a collection of detailed maps of sections of the city, where each map is annotated with a short list of key tourist sites, some restaurants, cafes and bars, and shopping places. Each annotation gets a two sentence description. The key virtue of the map is that it is extremely detailed, so it is hard to get lost using it, and if you do get lost, street names are shown in both roman and cyrillic characters, so you can pattern match street signs of you need to. The reviews of cafes was also a godsend when late in the afternoon, after a day of walking, you wanted something to fortify you until dinner. The only challenge was that the transit map was inadequate to navigate from the airport to downtown. I used this map in May 2008.

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
