

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Great book that has been around forever. In a nutshell, the author suggests that ppl, have hidden agendas/ulterior motives behind all of their actions. This may come as no surprise to you, but the way the book is written makes this all extremely fascinating. He describes many people little games and motives such as destructive games, attention-getting games, sympathy-seeking games, etc. what is nice is the book tries to give you the ability to put a handle on them; define them, name them, see the "moves" associated with them, describe the "payoffs" associated with them, and plan antitheses to them. Very interesting and a fun read.

Re-read this one after a friend who works in social services kept referring to it. I think it's useful. Maybe over-simplifying people down to certain agendas and scripts, when it looks to me that we're all these kind of loose collections of agendas that animate through us, not so easy to pin down, and not always wanting to be exposed.

This book is entertaining to read, and brought a lot of perspective regarding the ways people interact with one another. I would buy this again. I have recommended it to a few friends who I thought could handle it.

That we tend to spend a sizable part of our time playing "games" is no secret or novelty. In this book, however, Berne offers a classification and analysis of typical games that, if avoided, would allow us to lead more productive, satisfactory and happy lives. According to him, the overcoming of

the compulsion to play psychological games, especially the "bad" games, is not an easy task, but can be a very rewarding one. Though I have never tried transactional analysis myself, I tend to find his assertion very convincing.

I just did a review of "I'm OK, You're OK" by Thomas A. Harris, M. D.--and in that review, also mentioned "Games People Play". I truly believe it's important to treat these two books as a pair. Reading both provides a better understanding of what's behind the interactions with other people, as well as why some ways of communicating work well, while other methods are bound to end badly. Simple principles, and wholly logical. The books were published almost 50 years ago, but are as relevant today as they were then. Highly recommend!
