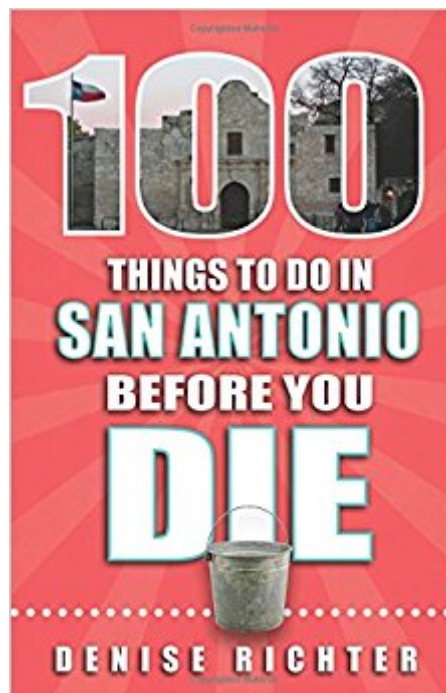




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100 Things To Do In San Antonio Before You Die (100 Things To Do Before You Die)

Recently had the opportunity to pick up this book. My experience with similar books has been that they're usually negligible in quality, editing, and content. Very much not the case with this one. Denise Richter did an absolute smashing job capturing all the beauty and bustle of San Antonio and did so with a humorous and engaging writing style, and not surprisingly did so without editing blunders. Many of the things listed I was only marginally aware of but have found many new places

and things to check out in the coming months. Many interesting facts are presented too, such as: King William neighborhood is the first historic neighborhood in Texas, or, that the remains of Jim Bowie, Davy Crockett, and William B. Travis are located at the San Fernando Cathedral. All-in-all, a great book, whether you've lived here all your life, or are just passing through for a few days I would recommend this book to everyone.

This is the first time I have ever read a travel book cover to cover in one sitting, but this book is so engaging that I couldn't put it down. It is filled with interesting information, written with love, wit, and remarkable skill.
